Call to Order.

On Wednesday, May 11, 1983, at 10:00 A.M. (the day and hour appointed for the meeting) Honorable Harold Washington, Mayor, called the City Council to order. Honorable Walter S. Invocation.

Reverend Tony Ahlstrom, Executive Director of The Plymouth Foundation of Chicago, opened the meeting with prayer.

STATEMENT OF HONORABLE HAROLD WASHINGTON.

Honorable Harold Washington, Mayor, made the following statement to the Members of the City Council:

Good Morning, Ladies and Gentlemen:

Once again, we may find ourselves in a parliamentary quagmire, but I believe the resolution of our differences is in sight. I see that through the spirit of compromise which characterized the creation of the negotiating teams, we will hopefully be able to get on with the business of the people of Chicago.

Let me explain where I believe we stand, both in the City Council and in the courts.

On May 2, the City Council adjourned, but a number of members stayed on and continued to meet. Obviously, we have a difference of opinion even as to that act of adjournment. After the adjournment, the members remaining purported to adopt rules and, as the acting Corporation Counsel stated, the City Council is a continuing body and, therefore, it takes a 2/3 vote of the whole membership to amend the existing rules. This was not obtained. Thus, there was no meeting to adopt rules; but even if there was, the vote was insufficient. Similarly, there were not enough votes to reorganize the committees.

The ordinance for the meeting of May 6 was vetoed.

The special session call for May 7th was defective because, as I stated, you cannot have a special session approve minutes, that is, the Journal.

Meanwhile, the lawsuits have been filed to make available court determination of our differences, if we cannot.

On Tuesday, lawyers for all parties met with Judge Murray and set a briefing schedule, consolidated the two cases and arranged for the intervention of the remaining aldermen. The case is set for hearing on Friday, May 13th. The court will rule on Monday, May 16th.

I do not believe the courts should have to intervene in the functioning of this City Council. But if we cannot resolve our differences, then the courts will have to, for we must proceed, and fairly soon, with the business of the City.

I believe that we must resolve our differences on a fair and equitable basis as quickly as possible.

I have no personal quarrel with anyone. I am a peace-maker and a man who reaches out to each of you for a fair, reasonable solution to our problems.

I have a recommendation which I believe is supported by just about everybody in Chicago.

Let's recess the City Council for several days until 9:30 A.M. on Monday, May 16th, to get our negotiators to the table, and have them come back with an agreement we can all support. The people of Chicago will respect us more if we show them we can do our business ourselves.

At this point in the proceedings, Alderman Bloom introduced the following motion:

"I move that the City Council recess to Monday, May 16, 1983 at 9:30 A.M."

At this unlawful assemblage, a purported resolution was apparently presented and purportedly passed, which on its face adopted (or amended) Rules of Proceeding for the City Council.

Under the laws of this state, the Mayor has the right to veto all resolutions affecting the expenditure of money. The creation of committees, a subject addressed in the purported resolution, is a necessary condition to the expenditure of funds for those committees and, as recognized by an earlier opinion of the Corporation Counsel, this purported resolution is subject to the veto power. It is my personal belief that no resolution was validly passed. Indeed, it even failed to receive the necessary 2/3 vote of approval. Nevertheless, because this matter may be submitted for clarification to a court, I must take definitive action.

I hereby veto and withhold my approval from the "resolution" which establishes rules for the City Council as; (1) the rules set forth therein are not as good as the people of the City of Chicago deserve and should be redone prior to passage; (2) there is reason to believe that the rules were discussed at a meeting in violation of the Open Meetings Act; and (3) Black members of the Council were intentionally denied participation in the formulation of the rules.

By this message, I am not ratifying actions taken at the illegally constituted post-adjournment assemblage of May 2, 1983.

Indeed, it even failed to receive the necessary 2/3 vote for approval. Nevertheless, because this matter may be submitted for clarification to a court, I must take definitive action.

I hereby veto and withhold my approval from the "resolution" which established membership on the committees of the City Council:

1) as the membership set forth therein is not a good combination of committee assignments, which should reflect the diversity of the City Council.

2) there is reason to believe that the membership was discussed at a meeting in violation of the Open Meetings Act and

3) black members were intentionally denied participation in the formulation of the committee membership.

By this message, I am not ratifying actions taken at the illegally constituted post-adjournment assemblage of May 2, 1983.
